Interpreting the Psalms

- 1. Reading the Psalms: What are they? Where do they come from?
 - **Gene:** ancient Israelite prayer-poems
 - Hebrew parallelism (Psalm 1)
 - Metaphor & Symbolism: solid rocks and tottering mountains (Psalm 46)
 - **Origins:** Davidic authorship?
 - Psalms as 'anthology' more than 'book'; ancient attitudes of authorship; "of David," inherently ambiguous; obvious anachronisms
 - Yet, superscriptions as canonical guide; David as skilled musician and composer;
 New Testament witness to Psalms as Davidic
- 2. Praying the Psalms: What are they for? How do they function as Scripture?
 - Sub-genres: psalms of orientation, disorientation, and reorientation; a.k.a. preais, lament, thanksgiving, etc.
 - A Psalm of Orientation: Psalm 1
 - A Psalm of Disorientation: Psalm 13
 - A Psalm of Reorientation: Psalm 30
 - **Function:** Liturgical guide and resource
 - Psalms as "anatomy of the soul" (John Calvin)
 - Psalms as devotional resource (Ellen Davis)
 - Psalms as theological resource, guide to prayer (Dietrich Bonhoffer)
